CHAIR'S REPORT

Acting Chair

Thank you to the Board for welcoming me as Acting Chair following Louise Scull's decision to step down as Chair at SFH to focus full-time on NUH matters.

I will be working with the governors to develop a timeline for the recruitment of a substantive Chair.

Whilst acting as Chair I will review membership of board committees and the pairing of NEDs with governors.

Staff Excellence Awards

I am looking forward to this year's Staff Excellence Awards which takes place on 3rd November, the day after this month's Board meeting. Over 300 entries were received this year and the quality of entries was very high, making it a very challenging task for all judges involved on the various panels. The event will give us chance to recognise and celebrate the work of all individuals and teams nominated, which includes volunteers, as well as all staff across the Trust for the tremendous hard work that has gone into turning around performance at Sherwood Forest Hospitals over the past year.

I will be attending the King's Mill Hospital Volunteer long service awards on 15th November to present 29 awards to our loyal volunteers with one award for 40 years of service.

Endoscopy Department achieves JAG accreditation

I wanted to put on record my personal commendation to the Endoscopy Department for achieving accreditation from the Joint Advisory Group (JAG) on Gastrointestinal Endoscopy. The JAG has representation from across the medical profession, including the Royal College of Physicians, the Royal College of General Practitioners, the Royal College of Radiologists and the Royal College of Nursing. It is a re-accreditation for King's Mill Hospital but it is the first time services at Newark have been included and reflects the commitment we have to developing high quality gastroenterology services there. About 14,000 procedures are carried out each year across the Trust with about 3,400 taking place at Newark.

Smoking on Trust grounds

The issue of people smoking whilst on our hospital estate was raised at our AGM in September. I am personally involved in the group which looks at this difficult issue, and would like to assure members of the Board that we have regenerated discussions around how we tackle it.



In conjunction with the local authority, we are currently exploring how we take a harder line on addressing the problem, including new signage and clear enforcement arrangements, with the possible use of fines.
