Please let us know if you wish to be seen by a female doctor or nurse; we will try to arrange this for you.

If you are having your period, you may still have the examination. If you prefer, you may change your appointment.

The colposcopy examination will take about 20 minutes.

Treatment has little or no effect on your chances of getting pregnant nor on your risk of having a miscarriage.

Facts:

- **One in ten smear tests are abnormal.**
- **Colposcopy examinations are very common.**
- **It is very rare for abnormal cells to be cancer.**

Colposcopy



You have been asked to have a colposcopy

Being referred for a colposcopy does not mean you have cervical cancer.

A colposcopy is a simple examination that allows a doctor or specialist nurse to take a closer look at your cervix (the neck of the womb) using a colposcope, which is a magnifying instrument with a bright light.

The colposcope stays outside your body and does not go inside you.

The examination should not be painful and is usually no more uncomfortable than having a cervical screening (smear) test.

If abnormal cells are found, treatment may be recommended. In many cases; this treatment is very effective at preventing cervical cancer.

What might happen at your appointment

At your appointment, your doctor or specialist nurse will first explain your results and ask you a few questions about your history or symptoms.

You will be asked to undress from the waist down and lie on an examination couch. A female assistant will be with you throughout.

A speculum will be gently inserted into your vagina, similar to a cervical screening (smear) test. The doctor or nurse will then examine your cervix using a colposcope. A liquid solution may be used to highlight abnormal cells. A biopsy (small sample of tissue) may be taken from the cervix.

Treatment to remove abnormal cells may be offered at the same appointment.

Important

If biopsy or treatment is needed, this may be carried out during your first visit. In some cases, you may be asked to return for a separate appointment.

Biopsy

Sometimes a very small sample of tissue is taken from the surface of the cervix. This is called a biopsy. You may have light bleeding or discharge for a few days afterwards. You should avoid vaginal sex for two to three days to allow your cervix to heal.

The doctor or nurse will explain how and when you will receive your biopsy results.

Treatment

Not all abnormal cell changes need treatment, as some return to normal on their own. Your doctor or nurse will explain if treatment is needed for you. If treatment is needed, it may be done at your first appointment or a follow-up visit. A local anaesthetic is used, and you can drive yourself home afterwards.

Treatment for abnormal cells has little or no effect on your chances of becoming pregnant or on your risk of miscarriage.
