Preventative health information for men having sex with men

Checks for sexually transmitted infection are recommended every three months for men who have sex with men. Tests offered routinely in this clinic are for chlamydia, gonorrhoea, HIV and syphilis. Testing for Hepatitis C is also offered.

In addition, there are now recommended ways to prevent some viral infections which may be transmitted sexually. This leaflet gives some information about these.

Vaccinations for Hepatitis A and Hepatitis B are recommended for men having sex with men (MSM). Some MSM are also eligible for and are recommended to have vaccination for Human Papilloma Virus and Monkeypox. These vaccines are available from the My Sexual Health Hub at King's Mill Hospital, and, excluding Monkeypox, at the Newark clinic.

Hepatitis A

Hepatitis A is a virus which affects the liver, spread by contact with infected faeces (poo). It spreads mainly by contact with food contaminated by human waste but can also be spread by sex where there is oral/anal contact.

Hepatitis B

Hepatitis B is a virus affecting the liver. It is spread by contact with an infected person's blood or body fluids.

Hepatitis C

Hepatitis C is a virus affecting the liver. It is spread by contact with an infected person's blood or body fluids. There is no immunisation available but routine annual testing is recommended as effective treatment is available.

Human Papilloma Virus (HPV)

This is a virus which infects skin and mucous membranes. Some strains may cause warts, while others may lead to cancers of the penis, anus and throat.

For MSM aged 15-45 years, a course of two vaccines is available.

Monkeypox

This is a virus which causes skin and genital ulceration. Vaccination is offered to eligible men, subject to availability.

Once all the recommended courses of vaccinations have been completed, men requiring a check-up, who have no symptoms, can book an asymptomatic screen.

The asymptomatic screen includes screening tests for chlamydia, gonorrhoea, syphilis and HIV, plus Hepatitis C. It does not involve a visual genital examination.

Asymptomatic screening tests are self-taken so individuals using this service will be instructed on self-collection of urine, and throat and rectal swabs.

Other information

PEP (post-exposure prophylaxis)

If you have had a possible exposure to HIV within 72 hours, taking a four-week course of particular HIV medication can reduce your risk of acquiring HIV infection. The following link has more information:
